History of Police Social Work

- Originated in the 1970's as a result of Professor Harvey Treger's Police-Social Service Project (Treger et. al, 1975)
- Funded by IL Law Enforcement Commission (now known as the IL Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board) as well as the cities of Wheaton and Niles
- Participating departments: Niles and Wheaton
- Philosophy: to employ social services within police departments to divert non-violent misdemeanor offenders from the criminal justice system
- Social/emotional ills vs. criminal intent

Pilot Study Outcomes

- Expanded to other target populations: domestic violence, juveniles, victims of crime, and mental health cases
- 1980's...more programs emerged designed to meet the unique needs of the community
- 1990s...continued program expansion: Neighborhood Resource Centers, Critical Incident Response, Crime Prevention and Community Education and Outreach
- UIC annual intern scholarship awarded
- Present Day: Over 62 law enforcement agencies employ police social workers in IL

What is Police-based Social Service? A highly specialized field of clinicians...

- Provides services in police related cases, as well as, to residents requesting assistance
- Provides crisis intervention, crime scene response, death notification, assessment, counseling, community liaison and referral services
- 24-hour availability
- Serves persons of all ages and diversity
- Cooperatively interfaces with members of the police department, courts, hospitals, community agencies, and schools
- Provides professional consultation in the field on difficult cases

Police-based Social Services cont...

- Coordinates and distributes financial assistance programs
- Coordinates youth violence/youth diversion efforts
- Offers professional and law enforcement training
- Offers community presentations and education
- Tailors services to meet the specific needs of the police department, the community, the family, and the individual

Benefits of Police-based Social Services

- Minimization of officer time spent on noncriminal calls
- Enhances victim cooperation with investigations and criminal prosecution
- On-going support services and follow-up
- Reduces recidivism rates
- Available consultation with a trusted mental health professional



Benefits cont...

- Multi-disciplinary approach to difficult and complex cases
- Joint collaboration with officers to decrease risk of injury and comprehensively serve community
- Positive community relations
- Ability to target special populations and assist with chronic recurring situations
- Advise and follow up to CIT/MH trained officer intervention

Common Issues Addressed...

- Violent crimes
- DV/Child abuse
- Juvenile problems
- Traumatic incidents
- Family conflicts
- Alcohol/drug problems
- Hoarders

- Psychiatric illnesses
- Mental health concerns
- Financial needs
- Homelessness
- Geriatric concerns/abuse
- Neighbor disputes

Common Services Provided...

- 24 hour crisis intervention
- Mental health and psychological assessment
- Court advocacy for victims/witnesses of crime
- Critical incident stress management services
- Case management services
- Mediation
- Police community liaison
- Professional consultation
- Short-term counseling
- Accompany LE in death notifications and support



Common Services cont...

- Information and referral services
- Financial assistance/emergency funding
- Resources for basic needs(shelter, food, clothing)
- Program development
- Custody disputes and child exchanges
- Domestic violence follow-up and safety planning
- Family interventions(substance abuse, mental health)
- Station adjustments/peer jury
- Collaboration with school personnel and administration

Association of Police Social Services(APSS)

- Professional networking and support group
- Educational opportunities
- Case review/consultation
- Website/information sharing
- Access to an extensive resource base
- Promote the profession and ethical considerations within the context of law enforcement agencies

APSS Considerations and Recommendations...

- Follow National Association of Social Workers(NASW) and American Counseling Association(ACA) Code of Ethics
- Master's level clinician in social work or counseling related field, preferably licensed
- Preferred working knowledge of the judicial system and/or law enforcement

APSW

- 40 hour domestic violence training/IDVA
- Suggested orientation protocol
- Contractual vs. Employee agreements
