MENTAL HEALTH

SOCIAL JUSTICE

RACISM

A MARRIAGE OF RACIST POLICIES AND RACIST IDEAS THAT PRODUCES AND NORMALIZES RACIAL INEQUITIES - IBRAM X KENDI -

HEALTH INEQUITIES

DISPARITIES IN HEALTH THAT ARE A RESULT OF SYSTEMIC, AVOIDABLE, AND UNJUST SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC POLICIES AND PRACTICES THAT CREATE BARRIERS TO OPPORTUNITY

STRUCTURAL TRAUMA

WHEN SOCIETY'S SYSTEMS AND STRUCTURES (E.G.- GOVERNMENTS, ECONOMIES, SAFETY NET SERVICES) AS THEY ARE CONFIGURED AND ROUTINELY OPERATE ARE INSTRUMENTS OF HARM

PRINCIPLES OF SOCIAL INJUSTICE

ESSENTIALISM

The belief that there are distinct, unchanging, and natural characteristics that define social groups and facilitate their categorization

ERASURE OF CONTEXT

Failure to consider sociohistorical context when seeking to understand the etiology of inequities

• BIOLOGICAL DETERMINISM

The false belief that racial groups are biologically and genetically different

• STRUCTURAL RACISM

"A system in which public policies, institutional practices, cultural representations, and other norms work in various, often reinforcing ways to perpetuate racial group inequity"







GENE + ENVIRONMENT INTERACTIONS

- Some born with vulnerability to impairments in judgment, cognition and/or emotional regulation
- Adverse experiences increase likelihood that vulnerability translates to problem behavior or illness



NEURAL SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT

- Emotional circuits and rewards in full gear
- Decision-making circuits and risk assessment less developed and more susceptible to emotional states and social circumstances



SUBSTANCE USE

- Greater brain plasticity + early exposure
- Increased susceptibility to problematic use



PRE AND PERINATAL ENVIRONMENT

- Inter-generational trauma
- Alcohol or other substance use exposure
- Lead and other environmental neurotoxins
- Inadequate nutrition

RELIABLY RACIST OUTCOMES



- MOST JUDGES ACKNOWLEDGE THE SYSTEM IS RACIST
- 80% OF STATE JUDGES ARE WHITE
- BLACK AND BROWN PEOPLE MAKE OF THE MAJORITY OF PEOPLE IN JAIL
- SENTENCING OUTCOMES DIFFER NOT ONLY BY RACE BUT ALSO BY SHADE
- BLACKS ARE LESS LIKELY TO BE REFERRED FOR M.H. EVALS OR TO DIVERSION PROGRAMS

MENTAL HEALTHCARE

HEALTHCARE SYSTEM INEQUITIES

• HOSPITALS*

Inequities are the result of a confluence of residential segregation, hospital imperatives to generate revenue, and state policy making

• HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE

Inadequacy of private and safety net systems

• OUTCOMES

Inequities by income, race, engagement, reception of evidence-based interventions, retention, forced hospitalization, stigmatizing diagnoses, early intervention

Crack Babies: The Worst Threat Is Mom Herself

AST WEEK in this city, Greater Southeast Community Hospital released a 7-week-old baby to her homeless, drug-addicted mother even though the child was at severe risk of pulmonary arrest. The hospital's explanation: "Because [the mother], demanded that the baby be released."

The hospital provided the mother with an apnea monitor to warn her if the baby stopped breathing while asleep, and trained her in CPR. But on the very first night, the mother went out drinking and left the child at a friend's house—without the monitor. Within sever hours, the baby was dead. Like Dooney Waters, the 6 year-old living in his mother's drug den, whose shock

 Intentional Design, Re-Counting, Iteration
