Opioid Maker Insys Still Has Fans on Wall Street

Insys Therapeutics has lost its former CEO and co-founder, John Kapoor, and several top executives, all charged with conspiracy to illegally distribute an addictive prescription painkiller.

The company has lost more than 80% of its market cap since its peak price in 2015 amid declining sales and multiple lawsuits from states over how it marketed Subsys, a mouth-spray version of the potent opioid painkiller fentanyl that is approved by the Food and Drug Administration to treat cancer-related pain.

But Insys hasn't lost all of its following on Wall Street.

Drug deaths rose 8370% in some US counties over 34 years CNN

Boone County, West Virginia was the county with the largest increase, 8369.7%, in deaths due to drug overdose followed by Wyoming County, West Virginia which saw a rise of 6973.1%. In addition to West Virginia, many of the regions that saw the biggest jumps are familiar from stories about the <u>nation's raging opioid epidemic</u>. Counties in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana and eastern Oklahoma saw the greatest increases in drug deaths: more than a 5,000% increase.

Fentanyl ban in state courts drawing fire

The fentanyl ban was challenged in late January in Salem District Court in a case against four men charged with possession and distribution of fentanyl.

Defense attorneys Meghan Somers Taylor, George D. Abi-Esber and Jeremy J. Sears objected to a pre-trial motion by the state to introduce photos of the drugs seized in the investigation rather than the actual exhibits.

Judge Randy S. Chapman denied the motion, citing the Trial Court's fentanyl protocols and finding no need for the introduction of the actual evidence for either the state to prove its case or the defendants to mount a defense.
