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Pennsylvania Interbranch Commission for Gender, Racial and Ethnic Fairness

The Interbranch Commission grew out of a study by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court Committee on Racial and Gender Bias in the Justice System in Pennsylvania. After an intensive three-year effort concluding in 2003, the Supreme Court Committee presented the Supreme Court with a report of its findings. Entitled the "Final Report on Racial, Ethnic, and Gender Bias in the Justice System," it contained fourteen chapters, each devoted to a specific topic of study, and 173 recommendations designed to address inequities within the system.

Determined to ensure that its work not be consigned to a remote shelf within the Court's archives, the Committee urged the Court to appoint a commission to advance the work of the Committee to the next phase: implementation of the recommendations set forth in the Final Report. Less than two years later, the Court announced the establishment of a permanent Commission whose mission was to be the implementation of the Committee's recommendations. Referred to as the Interbranch Commission for Gender, Racial, and Ethnic Fairness, the Commission is a unique fusion of all three branches of government in a joint mission to address these issues. It is considered a model among states who have undertaken similar efforts.

The Commission consists of 24 members whose appointments are divided equally among the three branches of government. Drawn from around the Commonwealth, the members are racially and ethnically diverse and include judges, attorneys, legislators, and community advocates. The bylaws provide each of the three branches of government with an opportunity to direct the work of the Commission through the power of appointing Commission officers on a rotating basis. Relying on the considerable research already completed by the Supreme Court Committee as a basis for its work, the key function of the Commission is to review and select recommendations for implementation from the Supreme Court Committee's study. The Commission's secondary goals are to raise awareness of the impact of gender, race, and ethnicity on the fair delivery of justice in Pennsylvania; increase public confidence in the fairness of state government; and to investigate and implement new initiatives not addressed by the study.
